



Detection of Human Trafficking in Clinical Settings

Human trafficking involves the recruitment, transportation, harbouring, exercising control, direction, and/or influence over the movements of a person in order to exploit that person, typically through sexual exploitation or forced labour. This global human rights violation has severe, well-documented impacts on physical and mental health, yet many trafficked individuals remain undetected, even when accessing healthcare services. Studies show that around 90% of those affected seek medical care during their trafficking experience, but more than half go unrecognized by healthcare providers.¹ Healthcare professionals are uniquely positioned to identify and assist trafficked individuals, offering critical support and services.

The objective of this project is to conduct a scoping review to identify the tools available for the detection of people in situations of human trafficking in healthcare settings, as well as implementation strategies. The findings will be disseminated to different knowledge users through social media, a peer-reviewed journal article, and a plain-language summary. Additionally, a knowledge mobilization event will be held in collaboration with the Alberta Coalition on Human Trafficking to facilitate discussions about how to mobilize the research findings to inform future research priorities and generate recommendations for policy and practice.
